# *THE BASICS OF OUR FAITH*

In the multicultural environment in which we live and work today, being called a Christian may or may not mean what we think it does. Many people call themselves Christian but are actually not according to the Bible's definition. To maintain a confident awareness of who we are, it is helpful to be reminded continually of the fundamentals of our faith.

In the most basic terms, a Christian is someone who believes in God as Father, and Jesus Christ as Lord, Savior, and Son. Regardless of denominational affiliation, embracing these principles makes us part of the universal church. Many people find these beliefs summarized concisely in the Apostle's Creed, or similar doctrinal confessions. [I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth: And in Jesus Christ his only Son our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried: He descended into hell; The third day he rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven, and sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty; From thence he shall come to judge

the quick and the dead. I believe in the Holy Ghost; the holy catholic {universal} church; the communion of saints; the forgiveness of sins; the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.]

## **The Holy Trinity**

All true Christians believe in the Holy Trinity. There is one God, but he is manifested in three personalities: God the Father; God the Son, Jesus Christ; and God the Holy Spirit. The three are co-equal and co-eternal, though our finite minds cannot fully understand this fact, but accept in faith how God has presented Himself to us in the Scriptures. As we study the Bible, we see how God formed us as a people, even though we rebelled against Him, how He sent his Son to dwell among us in order that we might be reconciled with Him, and how Christ promised that the Holy Spirit would abide in us as we looked forward to our reunion with God.

## **Sin and Separation**

From the very beginning, humankind, though created perfectly, fell into sin through the deception of Satan. Despite having had a pure

# MEET TINNETTA BELL ~ GIFTED HANDS ~

If you are familiar with Ethnic Expressions, then you undoubtedly are familiar with the famous drawings, *In His Dreams* or *Peace Within*. Directly affiliated with Ethnic Expressions, instantly I recognized the work displayed at an art exhibit in which, Calvary member, Peter Ambush's, works were also displayed. As I took the opportunity to gaze closer at the original drawings, to my surprise the artist, Tinnetta Bell, stood directly behind me, humble and gracious. She agreed to give me an interview.

Hard pressed one would be to believe, when standing before any one of Tinnetta Bell's works of art, that she is self taught, but she is. Born in Newark and raised in East Orange, NJ, since she was very young, Ms. Bell has been drawing. "The first drawings that I can remember [were] of animals," she says. With the growth and development of her talent, people have now become her favorite subjects, which include children, women and men. "I love expression. My goal is to capture an emotion that people can identify with, and in addition, create a beautiful peace of art."

Indeed, most viewing her work would definitely concur that she has accomplished her objective. Bell has a way of capturing the most in-depth and intense emotions one can express as seen in the piece, *Oops* (shown right), a drawing of little boy where upon immediate

glance, one would assume he committed an inadvertent act, evident by the expression on his face.

But, Bell doesn't just pick up her pencil and commence drawing. Like with the creation of *Oops* and *Little Boy Blew* (cover), a concept is employed before the creation of any of her work, which she then utilizes real people as references. "It all comes together," affirms Bell. Some of her more famous drawings are of people in the entertainment industry such as, Spike Lee, Bill Cosby, En Vogue and the rap group Naughty

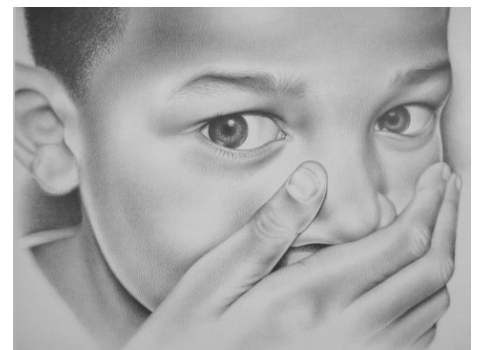
by Nature. When asked what she most wanted to convey to admirers, answered Bell, "I want people to see that I take my time with my work and that I pay close attention to detail."

A turning point in Bell's career came when she took the initiative to send Ethnic Expressions two pieces of her work. Their response was positive, stating that it usually takes them awhile

before contacting an artist. However, they expressed their admiration for her work and wanted to try the pieces out. For several years now her work has been displayed in their catalog. "It showed me that people thought more highly of my work than I originally thought and there is a demand for it." Availability of her work, in addition to Ethnic Expressions, can also be found in major galleries on the East Coast. Her work is also sold nationwide, retailing from affordable to thousands.

Bell is also a gifted photographer. "I do weddings, portraits, events and just about anything else you can think of. This talent is what I would call a spin off from the art. People just began to notice that my photography was done well. I was asked to do several portraits, then weddings. My clientele list has been growing steadily." A dream of Bell's is to open a gallery and photography studio, which is why she plans on dedicating more time to her art and photography.

# DRY BONES AND LIQUIDITY TRAPS

*I saw a great many bones on the floor of the valley, bones that were very dry. He asked me, "Son of man, can these bones live?" I said, "O Sovereign Lord, you alone know."*  
— Ezekiel 37: 2-3

After the biggest credit bubble in modern history, the U.S. economy looks more and more like a valley of dry bones. This metaphor is especially apt after New York's hottest summer on record, a summer when economic vitality dried up and blew away.

How can the economy remain dry when monetary policy is gushing with stimulus? Perhaps America is in a liquidity trap. This occurs when interest rates approach zero, monetary policy is impotent, and the Fed is merely "pushing on a string."

The specter of a liquidity trap haunts economists, who are all too familiar with Japan's zombie economy during the 1990s. This was Japan's "lost decade," so the possibility of a liquidity trap vexes policymakers on both sides of the political aisle.

Where, then, can investors find yield during an economic drought? Surely not at the bank, where short-term rates are negative after inflation. And surely not in exotic derivatives, since these were weapons of mass destruction during the real-estate bubble.

For conservative investors seeking to improve the yield of their portfolio, I believe that dividend stocks in defensive industries are a good place to start. This includes utilities, pharmaceuticals, and consumer staples. After screening by dividend yield and industry sector, I analyze balance sheets and cash flows to assess a firm's prospects for sustained and rising dividends. Screening for dividend yield is one tool among many, though it does have a certain appeal in the age of Bernie Madoff: You can't fake dividend payments.

Next, I suggest that investors consider companies that have a strong track record for diversity. Candidates include Verizon, Aetna, ADP, P&G, and other corporations on the "DiversityInc Top 50 Companies for Diversity". This list is compiled each year by DiversityInc, which does an in-depth evaluation of firms based on statistical measures of demographic data. These data range from supplier diversity to the composition of the boards of directors. An emphasis on diversity is one way that my firm, Right Blend Investing, helps clients "invest in their beliefs."

## Div2: Dividends and Diversity

The result of this screening and analysis is a portfolio that offers both dividends and diversity. In future articles I will describe additions and deletions to this list, as well as my investment perspective on the entire portfolio.

Dividends also impose capital discipline, especially when firms are flush with cash. Management is less likely to make dilutive acquisitions, and dividends are more of a commitment than stock buybacks. Hence, dividends are a sign of management's expectations, and research has shown that dividend signals generate alpha (excess risk-adjusted returns).

## Diversity as a Screening Tool

There is also evidence that progressive policies about employer diversity also generate alpha. Unfortunately, though, statistics cannot differentiate between cause and effect. Proponents may argue that diversity contributes to success, while critics may argue that it is merely coincident with success.

Diversity certainly helps some companies succeed. I am bullish on Schlumberger, which has diversity in its DNA. Since the company's inception it has recruited employees locally and promoted them globally, which is one reason I am a long-term holder.

Critics, however, will say that successful companies choose diversity after they become successful. For them, diversity is a luxury that firms can only afford in high-margin businesses.

Personally, I believe that diversity is like research and development: It requires upfront investment that generates returns over time. Firms that do not invest in diversity are just like firms that do not invest in R&D. These choices will eventually hurt profits, so both dividends and diversity provide valuable signals about a company's underlying health. This makes the Div2 Portfolio an attractive alternative for yield-hungry investors, especially in dry economic times.

"Can these bones live?" Only the Lord knows. But dividends and diversity are surely signs of life. ■

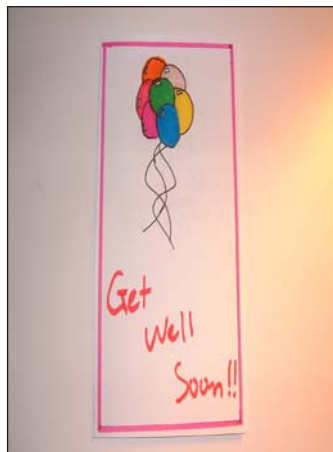
- Homework monitoring and assistance

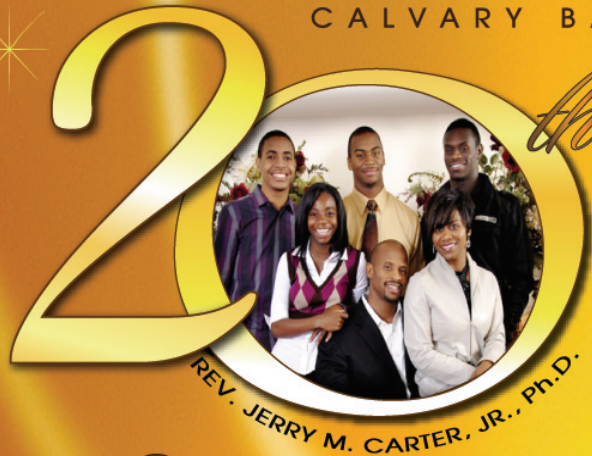
