

PERSPECTIVE BY MINISTER DAVID A. HOLLOWELL MANAGING CHANGE IN THE CHURCH

Reflecting upon our recent book study, "Our Iceberg Is Melting," one fact emerges that is an enduring truth: One of the constants in our world is change. Whether we initiate it or not, whether we agree with it or not, and whether we have control of it or not, change will continue to occur in every life situation. As Christians, we are expected to have a discerning spirit that will keep us aware of what is happening around us, but we are also expected to realize that our sovereign God is in control of our circumstances. Indeed, the Bible states that "... all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose. Romans 8:28-29 (KJV)

Nevertheless, even though we know that God in his divine wisdom is orchestrating events in our world, there are some practical things that we can practice that will help us prepare for change, be they great or small. It is paramount that we confront change with a positive attitude. Church and ministry participation for many of us is the center of our community and family life, and directs the flow of our daily and weekly activities. As a cog in the ecclesiastical organism, we as individuals can minimize the potentially negative impact of change by ensuring that we channel our thoughts and actions in a positive way to move in accord with God's will. When changes are made - be it leadership transition, shift in worship style or new assignments - there will always be people who struggle with handling the newness, but our steadfastness and confidence in God's wisdom can smooth the transition to change.

Some practical pointers for ensuring that change is managed in a positive way that keeps the congregation on one accord include:

- Include youth and seniors in all levels of planning, so that the young will feel their views are relevant and contemporary, and elders will find strength and comfort in tradition and the familiar.
- Go overboard in making everyone feel welcome and a part of the evolving church. "Radical hospitality" will make founding members feel as welcome as new guests and maintain a level of excitement that can enhance the acceptance of change.
- Seek and encourage new leadership that will keep ministries and operational aspects of the church vital and energized, and open to innovation.
- Keep the vision for strategic change visible at all times, but celebrate small victories that move the church progress along in incremental steps.
- Maintain open and honest communication with the congregation through every available medium. This will minimize any "surprise" announcements or decisions, and maximize congregational buy-in to any anticipated changes. The more aggressive and thorough the communication, the more effective the leadership will be in enlisting the support of the congregation, so that everyone will feel good about changes that must be made.

When we do our part in working with one accord with our Pastor and our fellow congregants to effectively manage change, we can applaud each other and issue the joyous declaration, "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!" Psalms 133:1.

Cancer's Racial Gap Narrowing For Some, Not All, Cancers

Racial disparity in cancer death rates African **Americans** is decreasing, but continue to bear a greater cancer burden than any other racial group in the United States, according to Cancer Facts & Figures for African Americans 2011-2012, the latest edition of the American Cancer Society's bi-annual report.

Cancer death rates in 2007 were 32% higher in African-American men and 16% higher in African-American women than in white men and women, respectively.

For nearly all cancer types, African Americans available at our table in the MJFH.

are far more likely than whites to be diagnosed in advanced stages of disease, when the cancer is less treatable. African Americans are also less likely than whites to survive 5 years after a diagnosis, regardless of cancer type and stage of diagnosis.

Please routinely visit your physician and monitor your health. The Cancer Racial Gap among minorities is growing. We will recognize National Minority Cancer Awareness Week April 17 – 23, 2011. Education material will be available at our table in the MIFH.

Black Heritage Program Review

Our Minister of Music, Ken Brown, called on his 30 year friendship with choral director, Dr. Gregory Hopkins and secured the Harlem Jubilee Singers for our 2011 Black Heritage Program. What a marvelous program it was! The singers demonstrated complex rhythms and elaborate vocal styles through call and response songs, solos and melodic choruses.

Highlighting the impact of music and song on the African- American struggle, Dr. Hopkins briefly explained "How We Got Over" by providing some historical background on gospel singing. They started out with a Nigerian chant, written by Donny Harper "in gospel idiom influenced by the Motherland" Holy Spirit You're Welcome in This Place. Doctor Hopkins said that, "Negro spirituals are the base of all American music." "Our music [Negro Spirituals] is considered substandard until white folk sing them," was part of his introduction to Little Lamb, I'm Gonna Serve God 'Til I die, "written

by a non-African American writer, Bartholemew."

They sang I've Been 'Buked and I Been Scorned by Harlem Renaissance writer Paul Johnson. The song starts out in sorrow - telling of sorrow and trouble all over the land, but ends in determination and defiance – not gonna lay my 'ligion [religion] down. Even the audience was joyfully engaged in a round of Must Have That True Religion and Give Me That Old Time Religion arranged by Roland Carter.

The apparent crowd pleaser was a wonderful rendition of Summer Time that received a standing ovation. For a short while we were all taken away from our mundane and arduous duties to revel in the uplifting beat of music. All who attended the event were both spiritually and physically nourished by the Black Heritage Luncheon hosted by Calvary's Golden Years Ministry. Most refreshing – most refreshing indeed!

Secret Pal was initiated in July 2010 by the Women of Purpose ministry as a fun way for women in the church to establish sister-to-sister relationships. PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE HONORS TWO CALVARY MEMBERS

Linda Murphy, Principal of Morristown High School, and Dr. Felicia Jamison, Chair of the Martin Luther King Observance Committee (among numerous other community involvements) were recently honored by The Community Affairs Unit of the Morris County Prosecutor's Office as key contributors to the community in their annual Black History Celebration.

The program was spear-headed by Detective Keisha Higgs and planned in collaboration with the Northern New Jersey chapter of the National Organization of lack Law Enforcement Executives (NOBLE). This annual event reflects the Prosecutor's Office efforts, under leadership of Robert A. Bianchi, Esq., to maintain mutual respect and good working relationships

with members of its constituent communities. Other celebrations that Detective Higgs and her unit commemorate include Irish History Month, Women's History Month, and Asian-American & Pacific Islander History Month.

Sister Murphy is a graduate of Morristown High School and her appointment as Principal is the culmination of a career and personal mission dedicated to teaching and nurturing students in the Morris School District. Her fruitful odyssey was launched in 1976 seventh-grade math teacher and has spanned serving for twenty-two tears as a high school math teacher and Vice Principal at Morristown High. In addition her to teaching and administrative duties, Sister Murphy has served as a coach, Peer Group Connection Coordinator, Coordinator of the PACE (Pursuing Academic Challenge with Excellence), Coordinator of the GPU Energy/JCP&L Diamonds Mentoring Program, and a member of the Morristown High School Site-Based Leadership Team. Having been recognized several times in her career as a selection for "Who's Who Among America's High School Teachers," Sister Murphy emphasized in her remarks the importance family values and support in helping our youth to focus on and pursue limitless opportunities available to them in today's world.

The other honoree, Dr. Felicia Jamison, has a legendary track record as an educator and community activist. In her remarks, she indicated that one of the foundational activities that helped to shape and direct her life of service was her tenure as a teacher in the Calvary Church School. Her secular teaching career began in 1963 as a science teacher in the Rockaway Township School System, where she taught and inspired students for twenty years, and went on to become the system's first black Assistant Principal. er became the first black Assistant Superintendent in Morris County. While pursuing her professional career, Dr. Jamison never lost sight of her passion for justice and opportunity for the broader community which led her into an explosion of initiatives, including: challenging the Fair Housing Laws that eventuated in her family becoming the first blacks to secure open occupancy housing in predominantly white Morris County; becoming one of the pioneering litigants who helped effect the merger of the Morristown and Morris Township School Systems to achieve racial balance; helping to found the Junior Matrons of Morristown, an organization providing leadership and scholarships for African American students over the last 52 years, and; co-founding the Martin Luther King Observance Committee, which has led the way in commemorating the legacy of this great leader for the past four decades.

In addition to honoring two Calvary members, the Young Adult Choir was invited to sing.

Please join us in applauding the work of these two giants, who have established an example for us all to follow.

Herman Scott, was supplied. Min. David Hollowell gave the invocation, introduced the theme, and displayed pencil and charcoal portraits of luminaries from black history. Sister Dorothy Hollowell was asked to coordinate the singing of the Black National Anthem by the community choir,
