

PASTOR'S PEN

FRUITFUL MINISTRY FOR KINGDOM EXPANSION & CULTURAL TRANSFORMATION



When you understand the Church's mission as being focused on God's mission, it impacts the way you do ministry. When we grasp that God — by nature — is a sending God, we can better connect with the fact that we are a sent people! As believers, we are sent by God into the world to expand His kingdom.

We accomplish God's mission of kingdom expansion when we practice incarnational ministry — ministry that says, "God wants you to come so you can be sent." Time and again we see Jesus calling His disciples by saying, "Come, follow me." After a period of training and fellowship Jesus sent His followers to help Him expand the kingdom of God, "As the Father has sent me, I also send you," (John 20:21).

The Church is on mission when it is making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The most visible way God draws people into the community of Christ and into relationship with Him is through congregations that practice incarnational, fruitful ministry. There are five basic practices of fruitful congregations: Radical Hospitality, Passionate Worship, Intentional Faith Development, Risk-Taking Mission and Service, and Extravagant Generosity.

Radical Hospitality – Christian hospitality refers to the active desire to invite, receive, and welcome those who are strangers. Radical means "drastically different from the ordinary practice, outside the normal," and so it provokes practices that exceed expectations, that go the extra mile.

Passionate Worship – Worship describes those times we gather deliberately seeking an encounter with God in Christ. Passionate Worship is worship that people enter into with

expectancy and with the anticipation that God desires to connect with them.

Intentional Faith Development – Intentional Faith Development refers to the purposeful learning in community that helps the followers of Jesus mature in faith - aspects of spiritual formation that one learns in community, through intentional engagement.

Risk-Taking Mission and Service – Mission and Service include the projects, the efforts, and the work people do to make a positive difference in the lives of others for the purposes of Christ. Risk-Taking refers to the service we offer that stretches us out of our comfort zone and leads us to make sacrifices for the glory of God.

Extravagant Generosity – Generosity is sharing and giving that exceeds all expectations and extends to unexpected measures. It is not extravagant to show off. It is extravagant because of the giving nature of the God we serve.

These five practices are basic and fundamental. If we are to be a fruitful congregation that practices incarnational ministry, we must learn and improve upon these practices constantly.



LIVING FREE FROM THE BONDAGE OF ADDICTION HELP US CARRY THE MESSAGE

Would you like to help others help themselves? Why not support a non-profit organization dedicated to empowering individuals to free themselves from addiction/addictive behavior? The George Gramby Day Observance Committee is just that! The Committee uses each of its fundraising forums as a mechanism to fulfill their mission while also building funds for their primary means of communicating with the community, the annual George Gramby Day event. Current Committee members are: Officers: Nita Whyte (Chairperson), David Burke (Vice Chairperson), Stan Prater (Treasurer), Miriam Banks (Secretary), Tina Lindsey, Ed Murphy, Kenneth Royster, Michael Strickland and Keith White.

The committee collaborated with the Urban League on sponsorship while they obtained their 501(c)(3) status and their current partnership is with the Morristown Neighborhood House. Working together with the Nabe, they just had their first successful 6th grade basketball tournament fundraiser, which they plan to conduct annually.

For those unfamiliar with the George Gramby Observance Committee, the following background is offered. George Gramby was the founder of Beginnings, a drug and alcohol referral center that helped countless recovering addicts turn their lives around. By working with local rehabs and outpatient facilities and mak-

ing Beginnings available for meetings, George was able to help others help themselves! Recognizing the value of George's contributions to the community, for the past 18 years an Annual George Gramby Day event has been held the second Saturday in July, not only to honor George and community residents and organizations that exemplify similar characteristics as George, but also to bring the community together and promote drug-free living by introducing recovery resources to individuals that are suffering from the disease of addiction and support systems to their families. For many, this is the first step to restoring broken relationships and moving on with happy, productive lives.

The annual event is a good, wholesome community day that brings together an average of 300 people from all ethnic and social backgrounds. It's the Committee's sincere hope that during the course of the day, people struggling with the disease of addiction find a deeper, stronger desire to seek recovery; that people considering their first encounter with drugs and/or alcohol are deterred; and that oth-

ers find the resources needed to stay clean. Because it is understood that helping those who are struggling with addiction is a collective community effort, the Committee is reaching out to you for support. Two fundraisers are planned to help finance this year's event that the Committee hopes you will attend: A dinner sale that will be held on May 15th at Brother Ed Murphy's home at 6 Highland Avenue in Morris Township and a Dance during Memorial Day weekend To Be Announced.

Additionally, there are sponsorship and volunteer opportunities associated with the George Gramby Day event itself. Porothy Height A CIVIL RIGHTS ICON PASSES

Born March 24, 1912, Dorothy Irene Height, appropriately known as the "godmother of the civil rights movement", passed away on April 20. An African American administrator, educator, and social activist, Ms. Height eloquently demonstrated what it means to live a life of service.

Denied entrance to Barnard College in 1929 because the school had an unwritten policy of admitting only two black students per year, she was undaunted and enrolled instead at New York University, earning a bachelor's degree in 1932, and a master's degree in educational psychology the following year. In 1980, Barnard College not only apologized, but awarded her its highest honor, the Barnard Medal of Distinction. Perhaps it was this blight early in Height's life that facilitated her to dedicate her life to making a difference in the fight for racial equality on every front.

She began her career as a case-worker with the New York City Welfare Department. At the age of 25, she joined the National Council of Negro Women, as a civil rights activist fighting for equal rights for both African Americans and women. In 1944, she joined the national staff of the YWCA. She also served as National President of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority from 1946 to 1957; however, she remained active with the Sorority



throughout her life. While there, she developed leadership training programs and interracial and ecumenical education programs. Under the direction of Height, "Wednesdays in Mississippi", a forum which brought together black and white women from the North and South to create a dialogue of understanding in the 1960's, was formed.

Height was also no stranger to the political arena. Leaders such as, First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt, President Dwight D. Eisenhower and President Lyndon B. Johnson sought her advice. She petitioned Eisenhower to desegregate schools, reminding him that black children should be allowed to attend the same schools as whites. While Height

never married or bore children, she advocated on behalf of others so a better life could be realized for them and their children. Height also requested that President Johnson appoint African American women to positions in government, helping him to understand that black women deserved to serve at the government's highest levels."

Sought out for other prominent roles, Height also served as a consultant on African affairs to the Secretary of State, the President's Committee on the Employment of the Handicapped, and on the Status of Women. Height was named to the National Council for the Protection of Human Subjects of Biomedical and Behavioral Research. They published The Belmont Report in 1974, for which Height wrote a response concerning the Tuskegee Syphilis Study.

Tributes in Height's honor took place around the country. President Obama eulogized her on Thursday, August 29, at the Washington National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. and ordered that flags fly at half staff at the White House and all public buildings until sunset in her honor.

MINISTRY AT WORK

Sick and Shut-In Visitation Part 3

Although visitation at a hospital or nursing home will generally follow the same pattern, visiting sick and shut-in members at home should be somewhat different. The situation offers a more intimate setting, and both you and the patient are usually more comfortable in communicating and fellowshipping. If other family members are present, this is an opportunity to share their feelings and concerns more openly without the self-consciousness that may accompany conversation and prayer in a public setting. Ultimately, you, the patient, and the family can forge a stronger bond that can lead to an ambiance of warmth and expectancy that will facilitate the healing and recuperation process.

Listed below is an abbreviated checklist that can be useful in planning an inhome visit, and ensuring that important elements are not overlooked:

Home Visitation Checklist


- 1. Always call ahead to determine a convenient time for your visit.
- 2. Remember that you are God's representative, God's servant. Start off with a brief prayer.
- 3. Make the visit friendly and casual, not stiff and formal.
- 4. Depend upon God for guidance, understanding and direction.
- 5. Talk about the Lord when it is appropriate, since the visit is ultimately spiritual in nature.
- 6. Learn to listen carefully as needs are shared.
- 7. Seek to evangelize if the individual

is unsaved, and to build them up if they are believers. Try to engage family members who are present.

- 8. Keep any information shared with you in strictest confidence.
- 9. Make necessary arrangements for any counseling needs.
- 10. Keep your visit under one hour 30 to 45 minutes is ideal.
- 11. Be very approachable; try to understand the needs of those you are visiting. If you promise to follow up, be sure to do so.
- 12. Read a passage from the Bible and have a prayer to close.

May God richly bless you as you visit our home-bound brothers and sisters. ■

Cancer Awareness and Support Ministry: Here to help

When the doctor has given up on us, a family member or friend who is diagnosed with cancer, we are often filled with trepidation and

fear. Just the word "cancer" can cause our blood pressure to rise and send us into the throes of emotional chaos and confusion. We ask: "Why me?; How could this happen?; and, Where is God?" These questions race through our minds and compel us to doubt the goodness and love of God.



At such a time, we may feel victimized, lost, afraid, or deeply disappointed that God would let this happen to us or our loved ones. Not knowing what to do or who to confide in, we sometimes sulk into a deep depression or suffer from acute anxiety.

Recognizing the need for advice and emotional and spiritual comfort in these stressful times, a group of concerned members of Calvary, spearheaded by Sister Ruth Russell, formed a ministry that sought to fill this void. With an initial focus on ministering to affected individuals, the founding members broadened the mission to include family members and others in their circle of friends. The ministry's platform for service was based on sharing

personal experiences, exercising the power of prayer, gaining strength and hope through friendships, and holding an unwavering love and trust in God's healing power.

By intentionally building a comfortable environment where members can share their experiences and concerns, the ministry has been able to help members find strength and

courage in each other. Members have committed personally and collectively to communicate information and provide resources to the congregation and the community about this dreaded affliction. One of the ways they battle this formidable foe is by participating in fund-raising events that help to underwrite cancer research programs and fund cancer awareness programs. One initiative that the group is aggressively supporting is working in partnership with the American Cancer Society to provide newly diagnosed patients with certified Patient Navigators who can help (1) cancer patients deal with the day-to-day challenges of cancer; (2) find answers to financial need and insurance issues, and; (3) locate support groups. Four Calvary members have acquired this certification.

For those who were unable to visit the fellowship hall after service on Sunday, April 18, 2001, the Cancer Support Ministry held a very informative seminar and awareness display about the ministry and cancer support in general (see photos taken by Carolyn White, a member of the ministry). You still have the opportunity to participate in their most current fund-raising effort. As a gift, you will receive a bottle of spring water. After consumption, the ministry



is asking that you return it in mid-May filled with as many dimes as you can collect. Other upcoming events include: the annual "Relay for Life" held in June; a Breast Cancer Walk held in September. and the Annual Community Health Fair held in October.

Please note that free cancer screenings are available at Morristown Memorial Hospital for males and females who have no insurance and who meet income limitations. Also, May 9 is Breast Cancer Awareness Day. Sisters, is it time to schedule your screening? Look for more information in the rounder stand at the Willow Street exit in both English and Spanish, or call one of the ministry contacts: Carol Poe at 973-216-8488 or Linda McNeill at 917-940-6616.





- Pray for strong and consistent adherence to our church's mission to study the Word, engage in worship, and participate in witnessing as we live out the tenets of our faith.
- Pray for genuine and intensive outreach to those outside the community of faith.
- Pray for resistance against secular humanism and false gospels that attempt to take our eyes off Christ and his message.
- Pray that we will be energized to the point that our Christian character and demeanor become contagious.

- Pray that all we say and do will not be done through strife and envy, but will be done so that God would receive the glory.
- Pray that the gifts that God has blessed us with will be joyfully used in His service.
- Pray that every day with Jesus will be sweeter than the day before and that we will not take for granted the mercy and grace that have been bestowed upon us.

As we begin, let us pray for restorative power day-by-day as we press onwards and upwards. ■






