What does this mean in terms of Church programming? Our culture is a "visual" culture. How should this impact worship? The congregation is steadily growing. What should be our plan in terms of location? The facts and questions go on and on. Our prayer is that God would



help us to minister to this present age.

The second verse to that old hymn of the Church "A Change to Keep I Have", says "to serve the present age, my calling to fulfill, O may it all my pow'rs engage to do my Master's will." We are looking back and looking forward during this season of Church Anniversary, in order to fulfill our calling in this present age.

Q: Is Temptation SIN?

One of the great struggles of all of humanity is the struggle associated with temptation. Whether it is the temptation associated with breaking a diet or the temptation associated with infidelity or being unfaithful, we've all wrestled with temptation in some shape or form. I would say that temptation can be defined as the lure or enticement associated with stepping outside of some prescribed boundaries.

For many of us the struggle is furthered intensified because we feel as though we're beyond temptation, or we should not be dealing with it at all. Temptation is not simply a possibility, but it is a

reality for all of humanity. James 1:13-15 says "when tempted, no one should say, that God is tempting me. For God can not be tempted by evil, nor does he tempt anyone; but each one is tempted when, by his own evil desire, he is dragged away and enticed." James in this verse not only highlights the reality of temptation, but he further examines the origin of temptation. God is not the author of temptation, but rather temptation starts with us and includes the enticement of the enemy. It's hard for anybody to be tempted by something or someone that they don't like. If I don't like chocolate cake, it will be awfully hard for me to be tempted

For the believer, our salvation experience does not equate to being exempt

from temptation, testing and trials. Jesus himself had to endure temptation in the wilderness (Matt. 4). We need to understand that temptation in and of itself is not sin, but rather yielding to temptation is. We're not removed from the lure of temptation or the possibility of sin, but we must be encouraged while we endure temptation that God is both aware of what we're going through and active in our circumstance. Paul as he wrote to the Church at Corinth says (1 Corinthians 10:13) "There is no temptation taken you but such as common to man: but God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted above your ability; but will with the temptation also make a way of escape, that you be able to bear it."

EDUCATIONAL FUNDING MINISTRY – A PRICELESS RESOURCE FOR PARENTS AND STUDENTS

In its previous role, the Ministry was responsible for administering financial awards to high school seniors, matriculating students and adults continuing education with financial need. In its new role the Ministry will continue to manage these financial responsibilities, but has taken on the responsibility of identifying educational information needs and presenting seminars to address them.

Ministry Leader Kim Artis met with Pastor Carter to express the desire to expand the Ministry's stated mission and address a void of vital importance to our children and their parents: the need to know critical educational information. Pastor told Sister Artis "Do what needs to be done to ensure that the Calvary family is well informed on critical subjects involving educational information."

The Ministry has moved forward with its charge and presented three seminars: "Navigating the College Application Process" which addressed the college application process, scholarship and financial aid information, essay writing skills and interviewing techniques; "The Sat Review", presented by the Princeton Review Corporation, focused on the tests that are required to get into college; and the "New Jersey State Testing for Kindergarten through Eighth Grade" featured quest speaker Dr. Albert Mussad, the Director of Curriculum for the Morris School District who discussed the use of these tests for class placement. Financial planning to prepare for college (it is never too early

or late to start) was also presented by a representative from the JP Morgan Company. All seminars were well attended and received excellent evaluations by the participants. An upcoming seminar entitled "Going to High School" focusing on the transition from middle school to high school will take place this spring.

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the GLORY OF the LORD – PRIMARY II Style

During the Christmas holidays I was listening to one of my favorite songs entitled, "And The Glory of the Lord". As I listened to this song, three things stood out for me:

- 1) The awesomeness of God's Glory,
- 2) So many remain lost and living in darkness, and
- 3) When God speaks, it is so.

As a Church School teacher, I thought about how this scripture magnifies the urgency of the salvation of our children and the importance of God's Word in their lives, and began thinking about a way to use this song in our Primary II class. After talking about it with Mabel Davis (Church School Superintendent); she suggested our class do it as a presentation. With that, Primary II went into "performance mode". We wanted to shed some light on the preparation and thoughts behind our interpretation of this scripture. For those of you who attended the performance we hope you were inspired, and for those who missed it, stay tuned for more creative expressions from Primary II!

On the 1st Sunday, in January we listened to the song and found the scripture in the Bible. Then, the class was divided into two groups to discuss the meaning of "The Glory of the Lord", and the word "Revealed".

On the 2nd Sunday we talked about things that kept us from seeing the Glory of the Lord. We all agreed that refusing to follow the 10 Commandments was number one, and that included burdens like: lying, cheating, stealing, drugs and alcohol, obsession with money, titles, designer labels and material things, laziness, lack of time, watching too much TV, misplaced priorities, personal problems, gossip, and not treating each other right.

On the 3rd Sunday we took those concepts and turned them into a cast of characters. The children used their imagination, artistic ability and talents, and worked hard to create most of their costumes and props. We had one quick run-through at the end of the class. Unfortunately, 4th Sunday presented us with a snow storm, and on 5th Sunday, we were "on". With virtually no rehearsal, Primary II performed "The Glory of the Lord."

Here are some after thoughts from some of our Primary II students and teachers on Isaiah 40:5, the performance, and what it meant to them:

Marquise Bourgeois: "Stop doing bad things to others, like mugging, stealing and killing and other things too. If you don't, there is punishment".

Breyton Croom: "Be positive and do your best".

Sholei Croom: Special mention to Sholei. She worked hard on her character "Time", but was unable to perform due to her BAPTISM!

Brandon Drayton: "Even if you are tired, or already have a lot of money, you should still go to church".

Deja Webster: "It made Sunday School fun and I learned a lesson too".

Aubrey Dumas: "Church is more important than hanging out with your friends".

Tayler Hedgepeth: "To me, the Glory of the Lord means: mercy on us, glory, magnificent, gives us blessings, wonderful, forgiving".

Kimberly Maduabum: Things are happening in life. It means a lot to me that the glory of the Lord will be revealed and all shall see it together. The play showed people in gangs, designer girls, gossip, TV, and burdens. I was a "Designer Girl" and I spent all my money on a hat and clothing, and I forgot the important things in life".

Chris Pooler: "It's bad to be a gang member, but it's good to be in the presence of the Lord".

Noel Pooler: "Whatever situation you're in, bad, happy or sad, God helps you through it and you don't have to worry about it because God will help you".

John Winston: "Things are going around that are bad, and there are people that will not go to church".

Sister Harriet Course: "We have hope in the future. God's glory will be revealed, and the truth is in God's Word. I hope it also renewed the faith of others. There is hope!"

Brother David Burke: "This verse revealed to me just how the Lord uses our children to present His Word to others. This was indeed a blessing to the students in the class and to the entire Church School".

For me, this experience was so encouraging, because it reinforced to me that as Church School teachers, our efforts are not in vain. These children are really "getting it". They are serious about

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Biblical Perspective

Knowing the Holy Spirit

"Now the Lord is the Spirit; and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty. But we all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord."

- 2 Cor 3:17-18

As we are all aware, our new church theme for 2005 is "Engaging Life in the Spirit." This teaching and preaching platform should provide us with tremendous opportunities to re-energize and empower ourselves to generate more productive and fruitful results in our personal lives and ministries throughout this coming year. Unfortunately, most of us as believers are probably less aware of the workings of the Holy Spirit than we are of the other two members of the triune Godhead. If we are to truly engage the Holy Spirit in making our witness and our praxis more effective, we must first get to know Him better. This article attempts to address some attributes and some misconceptions about His personhood and His deity.

Personage of the Holy Spirit


In Acts 13:1-5, the Holy Spirit acts as a Person. He speaks to the leaders of the church at Antioch. He instructs them, "Now separate to Me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them" (v. 2). Notice the personal references "to Me" and "I." The Holy Spirit, along with the Antioch leaders, sends out the missionaries (vv. 3, 4). Throughout the rest of the Book of Acts, the Holy Spirit is portrayed as a Person. He had inspired Scripture which had to be fulfilled (1:16). Ananias lies to the Holy Spirit (5:3). The Spirit bears witness to Jesus (5: 32). Philip is instructed by the Spirit (8:28). The early believers are comforted by Him (9:31). The Spirit tells

Peter how to act towards the men He has sent (10:19f). Peter recounts to Cornelius what the Spirit had told Him (11:12). The decisions of the Jerusalem council are confirmed by the Holy Spirit (15:28). The Holy Spirit exhibits personal traits elsewhere in the Bible. The Spirit "hovers" over the creation (Hebrew--rahap Gen 1:2, compare Deut 32:11). He is to send Israel's Redeemer (Isa 48:16). Jesus promises His followers that the Spirit will speak for them when they are being persecuted (Matt 10:16-20). The Spirit will teach them what they should say (Luke 12:12).

The Deity of the Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is equated with God in several places in the Scriptures. Peter considers lying to the Holy Spirit to be the same as lying to God (Acts 5:3f). Paul calls the Spirit "the Lord" (2Cor 3:17). Interestingly, the Bible of Jehovah's Witnesses (the New World Translation) renders the phrase "Jehovah is the Spirit." The Spirit distributes

gifts to Christians "as He wills" (1Cor 12:11). But it is God who sets members in the Church "as He pleases" (1Cor 12:18). In addition, the Lord directs our "hearts into the love of God" (2Thes 3:5). Yet, "the love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit" (Rom 5:5). The Holy Spirit possesses the attributes of God. He is eternal (Heb 9:14), omnipresent (Ps 139:7-10), and omnipotent (Luke 1:35-37). He knows "the deep things of God" so He must also be omniscient (1Cor 2:10f). Most importantly, God gives eternal life, although people must be "born of the Spirit" to be saved (1John 5:11; John 3:3-8). Further, God chooses us for salvation, and the Holy Spirit quarantees our inheritance (Eph 1:3-14).


