PASTOR'S PEN LENT A SEASON OF SACRIFICIAL LOVE



few years ago, I used this space to reflect on Lent - the 40-day liturgical season of fasting and prayer leading up to Easter. The forty days represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry by facing temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling. Each year Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on the Saturday before Easter. When counting the 40 days Sundays are skipped because they commemorate the Resurrection. This year Lent begins on February 25th and ends on April 11th.

In the Roman Catholic Church, Lent is observed as a time of penance by abstaining from festivities, by almsgiving, by devoting time to prayer and religious study. While Lent is not necessarily a season which is strictly observed within most Baptist churches, it is an opportune time for us to reflect on our spiritual condition. During this season believers consider the significance of the sacrifice that Christ made on Calvary's cross. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting *life," – John 3:16.* Contemplation of His love ought to inspire us to love.

As we strive to discover what it means to live "A More Excellent Way"- to make a commitment in attitude and action to seek the best good for our neighbor, we can fill this Lenten Season with meaning and transformation by abstaining from the antithesis of love, which is self-centeredness. Self-centeredness is seeking to have our own way at the expense of others. It can manifest itself as intolerance, a refusal to help others, greed, jealousy, arrogance, envy, resentment, dishonesty, or needlessly exposing the infirmities of others through gossip.

During this Lenten Season, let's intentionally monitor our personal habits, activities, and attitudes to ensure that we are seeking the best good for others and that we are abstaining from self-centeredness. Let's use this Lenten Season to engage in the discipline of communing with God daily by meditating on scriptures that encourage us to seek the best good for others, loving others as we love our selves, and fasting from self-centeredness.

Of course, the Lenten Season is not the only time of the year that we are to commune with God. Yet, it is a great time to rededicate ourselves to loving one another as Christ loves us. Let us observe Lent Season together by following the devotional calendar below.

BIBLICAL PERSPECTIVE

Demonstrable Rove

"I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." – Romans 12:1

As we have delved into the Calvary church theme for 2009 (....A More Excellent Way), our foundational study has centered on I Corinthians, Chapter 13. In this important section of Scripture, which is commonly described as the "love" chapter, God instructs us through the inspired writings of the Apostle Paul about the character, content, and constancy of love. Having examined associated passages stemming from this topic over the past few weeks, we have discovered that one of the essential elements of visibly expressing love is the giving of oneself to achieve the greatest good for our neighbors. Now that we have begun to understand the "why's" of love, our next consideration should be the "how's" of manifesting love as part of our spiritual walk.

The above passage from Romans, Chapter 12 gives us some notion of how we can move from hearing about and discussing love, to actually practicing love. The first step in that process is to realize that as Christians, redeemed by the blood of Jesus Christ, we have the enviable privilege of returning the awesome love that God has shown to us by giving ourselves back to Him. Although it seems daunting for us to imagine that our meager efforts at reciprocating God's love can begin to compare to God's boundless beneficence, we nevertheless are compelled to show our gratitude and desire to please Him by answering His call for sacrifice.

Thankfully for us, we can take comfort in the fact that God is not looking for us to even our account with Him. God gave His all, allowing His Son to become sin for us, and to give His life in order that we might have access to eternal life. God gave us this gift freely, as an expression of His love from the infinite depths of His grace. God only asks in return that that we acknowledge this supreme act of sacrifice on His part by presenting our own bodies as living sacrifices to serve Him.

When we reflect on God's goodness to us, it is logical for us to feel a heightened affinity for Him. If you love someone, then you will want to give to him or her. It's a natural expression of our love. In the case of God, the one great gift that we can give to God is ourselves. And the greatest response we can display is to make ourselves available to serve Him by serving others. By submitting ourselves totally and without reservation to God, we demonstrate the intensity and commitment of our love.

The surrender of ourselves to God lays the foundation for our growth and maturity as believers. Every day as we dedicate our hearts and minds to Him, He rewards us with the capacity to love our neighbors and to carry out His will. By giving Him the greatest of gifts -- our willingness for Him to possess our whole selves – God enables us to do that which we can never do on our own. And even as we give, God gives back to us, with full measure, pressed down and overflowing. That is demonstrable love!

ECODOES TODAY'S HAVE YOU OWING GOD?

Stories about our nation's current economic state are everywhere as we continually turn to our televisions, radios and the Internet for a glimmer of hope. The years of abundance that have been taking place have come to an abrupt halt, ending a season of excess and greed that has resulted in the actions of a few affecting us all. However, if we turn to our Bibles, we will be reminded that we serve an all-knowing, sovereign God, who assures us that He will never leave us nor forsake us (Deut. 31:16 & 31:8, Joshua 1:5, 1 Kings 8:57 and Hebrews 13:5).

When it comes to our money, especially now that some of us have lost our jobs, gone from working full-time to part-time hours, or can no longer rely on the overtime pay that once boosted our income, we can easily become tempted to believe that we can't "afford" to pay our tithes, offerings or honor our Vision 2010 commitments. It is during times like these when our faith is being tested. We need to remember that the dollars we are holding on to so tightly are imprinted with the words "IN GOD WE TRUST" - it doesn't get any plainer than that. Our faith is being tested. How are you going to respond?

According to Philip Lowe, CEO & Chief Investment Advisor, Exodus Capital Management and commentator on stewardship and personal finance, "We are at a point in time that none of us have ever experienced before and we need to be obedient in the face of adversity. Those who are trusting God will reflect that in their giving and He will honor that. He will be looking to see what we are willing to give up, what we are willing to sacrifice in order to remain faithful. He has given us so much. For one thing, as Christians living here in the United States, we take for granted that we have the ability to worship God so freely, which is something that people in many other countries and places cannot do."

If the economy is affecting your ability to tithe, Lowe recommends prayerfully considering what you can do without, keeping in mind that everything we have belongs to God and we are simply stewards of what He has given us. It's possible that you may have to "downsize" your home or car and examine your priorities.

God made the ultimate sacrifice to demonstrate His love for us when Jesus died on the cross for our sins. We can certainly demonstrate our love for Him by sacrificing whatever may be keeping us from honoring the tithe.

A Joint Celebration of Calvary's Legacy of Love

Calvary launched a unique celebration this March! We combined our Spring Revival and the commemoration of the church's 120th anniversary. But just before the festivities, under Pastor Carter's direction, a churchwide prayer of consecration was held on Saturday, March 7, seeking God's blessings on the revival services and all aspects of the anniversary commemoration. It was our desire that God would be glorified through our celebration of His faithfulness.

The prayer requests of the Calvary congregation were answered as crowds packed the sanctuary during the three-night revival, which began on Monday, March 9 and concluded on Wednesday, March 11. With superb exegetical skills, historical analysis, brilliant applications, and powerfully penetrating oratory, Dr. William Curtis, pastor of Mt. Ararat Baptist Church in Pittsburgh, PA., extracted from Ephesians, Chapter 6, three critical elements to fight the good fight of faith: (1) The Belt of Truth; (2) Shoes Fitted for Readiness; and (3) The Shield of Faith. The celebration culminated on Sunday, March 15, with guest preacher Rev. Tyrone P. Jones, IV, pastor of Messiah Baptist Church in Bridgeport, CT. Delivering the sermons at both services, "In This Place" and "Shaken But Not Stirred" both fuel and direction were provided for navigating through difficult times to achieve God's mission of kingdom building here on earth. This foundational passage summarizes the thrust of Chapter 13, which is to display love to the neighbor, which exemplifies all that Calvary has sought to accomplish in its long history of service, and what the church intends to do going forward – establish a legacy of love that will have a positive and lasting impact on Morristown and surrounding communities through our commitment to "Worship, Word & Witnessing."

MINISTRY AT WORK

A CALVARY IN-HOUSE DECORATING SERVICE

Has the ministry in which you serve ever planned an event, managing to fulfill all of the necessary components - acquired helpers, solidified the date, secured the Mahalia Jackson Fellowship Hall, created the fliers, even planned the menu only to be left with one last, unfinished, but very important detail that would add the finishing touch - transforming the fellowship hall into a beautiful room centered around your theme or purpose? Interior decorating is not one of your talents and your budget does not afford you the ability to hire an interior designer like HGTV's, Candace Olson. But have no fear. HGTV may be out of reach, but Calvary's not lacking in interior design talent. Under the leadership of Chair, Jacquelyn Chapman, we can now stake a claim to hosting events in style with Divine Designs (DD). Now, Divine Designs won't remodel your home, but it will transform the fellowship hall, set for academic learning, into a room set for fine dining. I took a moment to talk with Sister Jacquelyn to familiarize Calvary with DD's function and how they can be of assistance to ministries with design challenges.

Calvary Connection: I understand that you make the "quilt" of Calvary's church theme each year. Did DD spark from that? If not, what was the genesis of the ministry?

Jacquelyn Chapman: We refer to it as the "banner", which Pastor Carter instituted to communicate the annual theme. I made the first banner based on a conversation that I had with him years ago. He was considering a vinyl banner, when I suggested that a banner inside the church be "fabric – or at least felt". Pastor, not surprisingly, asked me, "Can you do that?" I remember gulping and saying, "yes." I made the "Seek Ye First the Kingdom" felt banner over 15 years ago as the result of that conversation, and I've been making the banners since then.

Divine Designs was approved as a formal Calvary ministry late last year. Prior to that, we who decorated on a regular basis, worked as an ad hoc team. We gathered people who expressed interest in decorating, and recruited some along the way. We are now the Divine Designs team, or as we sometimes refer to ourselves, "the Divine Designs decorating crew".

CC: Is this something that you've always desired to do?

JC: Decorating is something I've always enjoyed, but prior to decorating at Calvary, my efforts were primarily restricted to my home – nothing more involved than that.

CC: How are your services utilized at Calvary and what does one need to do to employ, so to speak, your services?

JC: In formalizing the Divine Designs Ministry, we established procedures for "client ministries" who request our services, and we are developing plans and procedures to increase the effectiveness of our ministry. Our current procedures include use of a Divine Designs Ministry Request Form, which will be available on the Calvary website in the near future. The form is designed to help us understand what is being requested and to formulate ideas. It also assists the client ministry in its planning, as we consider this to be a part of our role also. In developing plans for a particular event, the Divine Designs Ministry may also interface with other Calvary ministries and services involved in the project. For example, we collaborate with the Kitchen Ministry when food is being served. We also partner with Church Leadership to design, plan, and provide decorations for specific Calvary celebrations, events, and holidays, such as the 120th Church Anniversary Committee.

CC: What is the gamut of what DD can offer? In other words, it's recognized that you assist with ministry events, but if one is personally interested in your services for an occasion, such as, a wedding, would DD be able to assist them?

JC: Divine Designs is a Calvary ministry. In that regard, we only support Calvary events. We may, however, as individuals, work with persons or organizations outside Calvary.

CC: What are the general costs involved and how much advance notice do you need?

JC: Since our services are charged back to the client ministry, the starting point for our costs is based on the client decorations budget for the event. We confer with the client ministry to work within their budget, and provide expectations based on a tentative or proposed design plan. We charge the cost of

Come to the third floor educational wing between the hours of 3 and 7 p.m., Monday through Friday, and you may hear that ever-so popular kid noise that accompanies many after school programs. However, the sounds of the After-School Child Care Enrichment Programs and Tutorials (ACCEPT) vary from day to day.

If you drop in on Monday, you may hear the click of the keyboard as Sheronika Taylor helps the students hone their computer skills. On Tuesday, you may hear "Como estas!," being repeated again and again during Senorita Pat Bing's Conversational Spanish class. In addition to Spanish for youth and adults, other offerings include Public Speaking with Min. Michael Bethune and Voice Lessons with Joanne Schaffers. Drop in on a Wednesday and veteran teacher, Dorothy Parker, will provide help with writing homework. Need help with math? Francine Medley provides intensive math tutoring for ACCEPT students. Min. David Hollowell teaches art classes on Thursdays. Friday is Guest Day and Health and Physical Activity Day. Registered Nurse, Joylyn Espeut, has shared important health information and Jacquelyn Chapman has conducted a holiday wreath decorating workshop.

This after-school enrichment and tutorial program also provides homework assistance. Each day, staff and volunteers are there to lend a helping hand as students attempt to clarify and reinforce the lessons learned during their school day. In addition, ACCEPT students have the opportunity to participate in programs that deepen their understanding of various academic disciplines.

Sande Shruby helps kindergarten and first grade students with their assignments and extracurricular activities. Min. Odetta Dumas, program administrator, keeps everyone uplifted with Bible stories and activities. Vanessa Brown, program coordinator, reinforces the importance of multiplication by assessing students for accuracy and speed at the end of each week.


God has truly poured out His wondrous talents upon the Calvary Family in diverse ways. So, we thought to utilize the Calvary Connection as a vehicle to share the gifts and talents of those in our fellowship that may not otherwise ever be known. Some of you may know Peter as one of the tenor soloists in the Men of Standard Choir. But I'd like to introduce you to, Ambush, the artist.

At approximately, five or six years old, Peter (AKA Ambush), remembers seeing a Nativity scene done in pastel that his dad created for their church. Naturally, one might think it was the catalyst that ignited the artist in Peter; however, he says, "I didn't know he had that talent and I haven't seen him do anything since then, but I guess that's what sparked the artist in me." Cartoon characters like Mighty Mouse, Bambi and Bugs Bunny were some of Ambush's earliest drawings. Even then he found himself to be an entrepreneur, selling them to friends in school for ten cents. Though his parents really never encouraged him to become an artist, Peter made the decision to do so his senior year of high school. "I decided I would go to an art college and my dad was okay with that". He received his bachelor's degree in fine art from the Maryland Institute College of Art in Baltimore. He also studied at the duCret School of Art in Plainfield, N.J. where he now teaches. For more than a decade, he worked as a graphic artist and illustrator for the Star-Ledger newspaper in Newark, N.J. Over 400 cover illustrations for the paper's weekly TV guide were his creations.

Ambush's portfolio numbers in the hundreds. When asked his particular style of art, he describes himself as a, "portrait artist and I paint in a photorealist style. A lot of people mistake my work for photographs." If you've ever seen any of his work, indeed you would. It's so incredible; it's hard to believe he actually painted it. He paints on commission and has even painted portraits for wellknown people like Ashford and Simpson, Isaac Hayes, Avery Brooks, Cornel West and Nancy Cartwright, the voice of Bart Simpson.

His dream is "to support his family, solely from his artwork, to inspire people and bring joy into their lives. I love when God allows me to minister to someone through my work. I love talking to people about what I do."

His advice to aspiring artists, "Stay focused. There are a lot of distractions that will try to keep you from doing what God has blessed you to do. Also, be open to criticism. Seek it out from a mentor, fellow artists or from friends... Listen to what they say, meditate on it and decide whether it is a valid observation. Sometimes others can see things we don't. One last thing, never stop trying to improve upon your skills, either through books, magazines, workshops or art classes. You should never think that there's nothing new or different out there you can't learn.

materials, supplies, rentals, etc. to the client. And, we utilize client ministry members as the decorating "crew" to implement the design, where they retain ownership of the project.

Our goal is to provide cost effective décor that reflects our Christian walk, communicates the ministry's theme, and appeals to the eye.

Ideally, we like lead time of at least six weeks prior to the event. For larger events, we request additional time.

CC: Are there others who assist you in the ministry? If so, who are they and is there a need for additional help?

JC: I serve as Chair of the new Divine Designs Ministry,

and there are four Co-Chairs. Gina Bullock and Lynne Pittman have worked with the Calvary decorating effort for several years. The three of us serve as lead project managers, where we design and plan major projects for the ministry. Denise Reid and Marcia Shruby are newer in these roles, but are taking on responsibilities to lead ministry projects. We are blessed with other dedicated members who form a ministry that is positive, energetic, and committed to our decorating effort.

There is always a need for additional help, and we invite Calvary members to join us. Our ministry allows us to be creative, to work in practically "hobby" mode, to see the end product, and to serve God – all at the same time! What a privilege!
