Power Belongs to God

recently heard a Republicanpolitical analyst refer to Democratic presidential candidate, Barack Obama as "Jesus." For several months the enemies of Obama have been calling him "Messiah." This caricature is meant to be an insult to Obama and his supporters. The Republican right has been consistently insinuating that Barack Obama has a "Messiah complex" and that his supporters exalt him as though he is some kind of deity. This view is an attempt to discredit the attention that Obama has captured and the movement of change that he has initiated. This is another example of demeaning and denigrating something that you can't destroy.

These attempts to slow down this movement of change on the part of some Republicans, as sinister as they may be, have reminded me that we have to be careful about placing too much confidence in political figures. Neither John McCain nor Barack Obama has all the solutions to life's problems! There is nothing wrong with getting behind a candidate and supporting him, or her. The church should be involved in politics. Politics affect people's lives, and we are interested in people's lives. Therefore, we should be wholeheartedly conscious of and connected to the political process. Every child of God should vote!

But we must be mindful of where we place our real confidence. The temptation to place our trust in elected officials is especially appealing this year. After eight years of what we've had, everyone is talking about change. The constant threat of terrorism, the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, and the economic instability in our country and abroad have created an atmosphere of fear and anxiety. Hence, talk of reform and change is



very attractive. Beyond these factors, the presence of an African American and a woman in this presidential race has instilled marginalized people with a hope that is as refreshing as the morning dew. Never have so many different groups of people in this country been this engaged in a presidential election. One way or another, history will be made.

Be that as it may, we have to be careful about where our ultimate confidence is. As I reflected over this thought, I just happened to be reading Psalm 62 in my devotion. This Psalm says "He (God) only is my rock and my salvation; he is my defense...(v. 2)." The psalmist continues his expression of confidence by saying "My soul, wait thou only upon God: for my expectation is from him (v.5)." This psalm reminded me of where my real trust and confidence should be. Our ultimate confidence is in Jehovah. This does not mean that we isolate ourselves from the process. But it does mean that we should keep everything in proper perspective. There should be some excitement about this presidential election. But, at the same time there should be excitement on another level about the One who is neither Democrat nor Republican - the One who sits on the throne forever.

As we analyze the foreign and domestic policies of the respective candidates; as we watch the debates on television; as we wear the buttons and tee-shirts; as we pray for guidance; and as we go to the polls to cast our vote; we should be ever mindful of Psalm 62:11 which reads "God hath spoken once; twice have I heard this; that power belongeth unto God."

on her bookshelf. I began making a few suggestions as to how she could revive her dream. I was really hurt to hear her excuses for why she couldn't possibly become a cartoonist. Her lack of understanding of the power of God bothered me.

God plants the seeds of our dreams in our hearts. His spirit engulfs our hearts and our minds with a purpose. It is our charge to recognize it, nurture it and pursue it. It's a beautiful thing to acknowledge God's purpose for our lives, giving us something to strive for. The would-be cartoonist seemed to be passionate about the idea of having a dream but not necessarily accepting or owning the dream. Her words didn't match with her actions.

What about you -- are you living your dream? Do you have a dream? I would venture to guess that most people are not living their dream. It

takes faith to pursue one's dream, and depending on its nature, the willingness to take a risk. But all along the way, you must hold on to your faith in Jesus Christ. Remember that God loves you. He promised: "never will I leave you; never will I forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5). You have all that you need to live that dream you have tucked away. Come on, I know you have it in you. Whether it is owning a business, completing your college education or running in a marathon, you can do it. You can become more physically fit by next summer. You can travel to another country to learn its culture. I once dreamed of driving up the mountains of Pikes Peak in Colorado, and I did it. When I saw those amazing mountains all I could do was tell God over and over again how marvelous He is. What is it that excites you? Whatever energizes or motivates you, know that you can do it. It may take just days or months or years to accomplish it. It doesn't matter. Remember that Jesus Christ is the source of your strength. It's absolutely true! We profess that we can "do all things through Christ who strengthens us,"(Phil 4:13). I'm not a biblical scholar, but it says ALL things. Do you believe those words for yourself? You can do it!

Pursuing your dream is a process and a sweet one when the Lord God is your partner. So, with unshakable faith, resilient determination and great expectation, go and live your dream. God bless you!

Interestingly, Jesus after rising from the grave, admonished us all to "preach" the gospel and yet not all of us are preachers literally. So what did He mean? To preach means to proclaim, to tell. CBC PRESENTS THE VISION 2010 "20 FOR 10 CHALLENGE"

Dove tailing off of the 50 Million Pound Challenge concept, we offered Calvary Baptist Church members a chance to improve their health by exercising, eating right and losing weight. Those who committed to losing 10 pounds in 10 weeks were challenged to get 20 people to sponsor them. The 20 sponsors each agreed to pay \$10 (\$1 per pound over the 10 week period). Members were invited to weigh in by sheepfold. The Wellspring/Health & Healing Ministries offered exercise classes to help achieve goals and held a session with a nutritionist to promote healthier eating habits.

Four participants – Jesse Alexander , Maurice Hedgepeth , Al Nobles and Lynne Pittman, – shared their experience with The Calvary Connection and their enthusiasm about accomplishing some personal goals and contributing to our collective work of fulfilling Vision 2010.

Lynn Pittman who lost 13 pounds noted that weight loss is a personal challenge that she feels she has finally been able to conquer. She said that she may slip every now and then, but it feels good not to be a slave to food. Deacon Jesse Alexander who lost 13 pounds said he feels better physically and mentally. Deacon Al Nobles who lost 13 pounds was motivated to improve his eating habits and better manage his diabetes. And Maurice Hedgepeth who lost 12 pounds said that he thinks there is still more work to be done for our health whether physical or financial.

CC: How did you lose the weight?

HEDGEPETH: I lost the weight and inches by changing the foods I ate. I consumed more fruit and vegetables. I ate less junk food and desserts (desserts are my downfall). What we fail to realize is that we can still eat the foods we grew up on, but just less. We do not need to eat the entire cake just to see what it tastes like. If we eat in moderation everyday, that alone would be a big step toward a healthier lifestyle. The second part of losing weight that was key for me was exercise. I walked to and from the gym instead of driving. By the time I arrived at the gym my heart rate was up; my body was warmed up and ready to go.

NOBLES: Portion modification; watching what and how much I ate. I drank diet tea and water. No soda.

CC: What type of impact did it have?

ALEXANDER, HEDGEPETH, NOBLES, PITTMAN : I eat much healthier

CC: What was your inspiration/drive to lose the weight?

HEDGEPETH: My inspiration to get into a healthier lifestyle is my children. My children are 13, 10, and 8. If I can teach them now about healthy eating, living and exercise, this is something they can pass on to their children one day.

PITTMAN: I wanted to change the adjectives that people used to describe me. On more than one occasion I had overheard someone trying to describe me to someone else and the way that was most common was, "the heavy set girl with the pretty face." So I needed to change the adjectives that people used for me.

Maurice Hedgepeth added, "This was a great step, but we should have another challenge very soon especially with the holidays coming up. We literally are killing ourselves as a people when we shovel unhealthy foods into our mouths during the holidays, and then sit around and do nothing. Moderation, Moderation, Moderation, \H

"We should know have individual challenges with not only weight loss, but inches lost, body fat lost. etc. We could have prizes such as personal training sessions, spa day, maybe a weekend trip away. If we truly believe that the body is the temple for the Holy Spirit, we should treat our bodyiesas temples and not shacks."

Recently the Calvary Youth Ministry presented a "State of the Ministry" to update families on how young people are growing and learning and what is on the horizon for our youth. Min. Anthony Riley, Staff Minister to Youth, shared some of the highlights with the Calvary Connection.

Dear Parent(s),

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. It is with great joy that I write you to address the State of the Calvary Youth Ministry.

Calvary Youth Ministries have been on the move! Lives are being transformed, ministries are blossoming and servant leaders are being equipped – all to the glory of God and for the advancement of the community. Get on board...

To date, the Youth Ministry has been to the Liberty Science Center, Dave and Buster's, Barnum & Bailey's Ringling Bros. Circus and a Nets basketball game, just to name a few venues. We look forward to hosting the biggest Hallelujah night ever! Youth and teens, save the date. Also, in December we are headed to New York City to see the Christmas Spectacular.

Motions of Praise and Sounds of Silence have teamed up to more frequently enrich the worship experience. Motions of Praise memorized bible verses on liturgical dance, and Sounds of Silence participated in the Celebration of Education and Festival of Arts. In 2008-2009, Sounds of Silence will further develop their ministry through mime. The Primary/Youth Choirs added several new selections to their repertoire, while welcoming new soloists.

Academic Enrichment enhanced its tutoring program and integrated the use of Wellspring Center's computer lab. Children's Church has seen tremendous numerical growth. Youth Christians Seeking Instruction (Bible Study) is utilizing Arts, Storytelling/ Drama, Video, Games and Music. In 2008-2009, Youth CSI will feature independent classes for grades 6-8 and 9-12. The 2008 Youth Enrichment Summer (YES) Program enjoyed learning how to have joy in serving our friends, community, neighbors, family and Jesus.

Boyz II Men saw the rebirth and revitalization of the CBC Stepperz who represented Calvary well at Cathedral International, Neighborhood House, Calvary's Celebration of Education and Festival of Arts, and other events. Teens Loving Christ (teen girls) hosted a moving workshop on self-esteem. The girls bonded with women in our church family and their servant leaders. Youth Night continues to provide a safe environment for structured Christian fun.

Purpose Statements - As one pastor/preacher has taught, when we do not know the purpose of ministry, it is likely to be abused. Every youth ministry now has: 1) a biblical foundation; 2) a clearly defined purpose statement; 3) specific objectives that realize the purpose; and 4) 3-6 month measurable growth goals. This firm foundation determines the content and calendar for each ministry.

All youth from grades 6-12 are invited to apply to be a part of the Youth Council Student Leadership Program. Youth are called and appointed after much prayer and a discernment process that includes: completing an application, an interview and a commitment discussion with his/her parents to serve in a specific area of youth ministry. They will receive individualized leadership development training from adult leaders and staff ministers. If you are interested see me for an application.

Youth Worship is specifically purposed to train youth in grades 4 through 7 on the 'why's and 'how's of worship. By the end of a youth's season in Youth Worship, they should be active and able to fully participate in and contribute to both Youth Worship and corporate worship in the sanctuary. Teen Rows are designated in the 10:45AM worship. These rows: 1) emphasize their priority in the worshipping life of the church; 2) encourage engagement in the worship atmosphere; and 3) entice our youth to see themselves as worshippers and not spectators.

Lastly, Family Sundays are observed each first Sunday. Families with young people are incouraged to worship together. Adults without young people worshipping in the congregation are incouraged to connect with youth without worshipping parents by sitting together.

Servant Leadership Development and servant appreciation are priorities in youth ministry. We have established biannual youth ministry vision conferences and quarterly empowerment training sessions, each with the purpose to equip the saints for the work of the ministry, (Ephesians 4:12). During our 2008-2009 Youth Ministry Vision Conference, we discussed this year's focus: relationships.

Our aim, this youth ministry year, is to begin to see dynamic relationships formed and flourishing between: 1) our servants and youth; 2) amongst our youth; 3) amongst our servants; and 4) between the ministries and families.

A CALL TO ACTION

As of late, I have been seized by the idea that many of the behaviors that youth feel free to express are those that they unconsciously picked up watching adults. Please join me in my renewed commitment to model discipleship, membership and other Christlike behaviors.
