THAT WAS THEN, THIS IS NOW: THE GOD OF NEW THINGS

As we move through the book of Joshua together we will discover that the Bible is full of stories about God doing new things! While this year's thematic emphasis – New Wine in New Wineskins – is based on the radical newness of the gospel of Jesus Christ, the Old Testament book of Joshua is actually a book of new beginnings for the people of God.

When the story opens, after 40 years of wandering in the wilderness, the people of God are finally ready to cross over into and claim the Promised Land. Through Joshua, God will lead His people into uncharted territory. They are going to a place their ancestors only dreamed about! Moses was a hero to their ancestors. Guided by the mighty hand of God, Moses led them out of captivity in Egypt across the Red Sea. That was God's new thing for them.

At the opening of the book of Joshua, we are told that Moses, the one who led the exodus and brought the law, has died. It was 40 years ago when they entered into

the Wilderness. Those who crossed the Red Sea with Moses have also died. A new group of people (new wine) are entering, or pouring, into to a new land (new wineskins). And, God has called Joshua, a new leader. While it is natural for us to mourn the death of Moses, Joshua's appointment gives us a cause for celebration. God's promise to be with Joshua, "Just as I was with Moses," shows us that even after God buries His workers, His work continues. His promise is fulfilled.

Long before we meet Moses (Exodus 2), God made a promise to Abraham (Genesis 12). Even while God is using Moses to accomplish His plan, Joshua is born (Numbers 13). As a member of the tribe of Ephraim and the first-born son of Nun, Joshua's life was in danger in Egypt on the night of the Passover. In fact, his life was saved because his family painted the blood of an unblemished lamb over their door post (Exodus 11-12). This is something else to shout about. Even while God is using a Moses, there

is a Joshua in training and there are people in Joshua's life who are being guided by God!

While serving as Moses' minister, Joshua was one of 12 spies sent to check out the Promised Land. We see at that point (Exodus 17) – when Joshua and Caleb are the only two to give a positive report – that Joshua wasn't afraid to confront the enemy and trust God for victory. Perhaps this is one of the reasons he is chosen as Moses' successor (Deut 3:23-29).

While the Bible doesn't tell us exactly why Joshua was chosen to succeed Moses, it does let us know that we can be strong and courageous because the Lord is with us just as He was with Moses and Joshua. We learn that in the Old Testament.

When Jesus comes on the scene in the New Testament, God does something even greater to ensure us victory. Jesus talks about it in Matthew 9:17. God makes us new. Paul says we become new and old things are passed

away (2 Cor. 5:17). Jesus says unless we become new, we can't handle the new things God has in store for us. God's new things will burst our old skins. Therefore, we must allow God to renew our minds and our spirits.

Will you journey with us as we travel into new uncharted territories? The book of Joshua ensures us that though there may be obstacles, we will reach the land God has prepared – whatever that they mean for us as individuals – because the Lord is with us. Collectively as a congregation, we will build a new place of worship because God made us a promise. And, the God we serve is a promise keeper. ■

THE NAACP: AN ENDURING LEGACY

Although we hear often about the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) in the print and broadcast media, we need to stop and reflect now and then about the impact this great organization has had on the social, political, legal, and economic history of America. This historical reminder is all the more important in light of plans for Pastor Carter to present the keynote address at the upcoming annual dinner of the Morris County chapter.

Founded on February 12, 1909, the NAACP is the nation's oldest, largest and most widely recognized grassroots-based civil rights organization. It is comprised of more than a half-million members and supporters throughout the United States and beyond, and its leadership has been in the forefront of advocacy for civil rights, the fight for jobs, housing and education, and conducting voter registration and mobilization across the nation.

The NAACP was formed partly in response to the brutal practice of lynching blacks, as well as the 1908 race riot that occurred in Springfield, the capital of Illinois and burial site of President Abraham Lincoln. Dismayed by the continuing rise of racial violence, a group of concerned whites issued an appeal to establish a national forum on race. Among those who responded was a trio of prominent blacks; W.E.B. DuBois, Ida Wells-Barnett, and Mary Church Terrell. Embracing work that had already begun by Du Bois' Niagara Movement in 1905, the new group's stated goal was to secure for all people the rights guaranteed in the 13th, 14th, and 15th Amendments to the United States Constitution, which promised an end to slavery, the equal protection of the law, and universal adult male suffrage, respectively.

As a voice for the organization in its fight for civil rights, Du Bois founded The Crisis magazine, which remains even today as the official publication of the NAACP. With a strong emphasis on local organizing, the NAACP established branches across the country, which have worked tirelessly to combat discrimination.

From battling the racist film "Birth of a Nation" in its early years, to advocating for jobs and voting rights during the civil rights era, the NAACP's 300 branches have waged war against social and legal barriers to equal opportunity. Individuals like Walter White and Charles Houston helped mentor and partner with Thurgood Marshall in the NAACP's successful effort to overthrow segregation in education, outlaw discrimination in public accommodations, and enforce voting rights for all citizens.

Though criticized by other direct-action organizations, the NAACP has sought through legislative and judicial means to

change laws and circumstances for minorities. A long list of national and regional leaders has emerged from the organization, including James Weldon Johnson, Walter White, Roy Wilkins, Benjamin Hooks, Medgar Evers, Ella Baker, Daisy Bates, Clarence Mitchell, Kweisi Mfume, Bruce Gordon, Myrlie Evers-Williams, and the current President & CEO, Benjamin Todd Jealous. Locally, the Morris County chapter has been led for many years by Reno Smith and is currently headed by Keith Bodden.

Heading into the 21st century, the NAACP is focused on disparities in economics, health care, education, voter empowerment and the criminal justice system while also continuing its role as legal advocate for civil rights issues. While much of NAACP history is chronicled in books, articles, pamphlets and magazines, the true movement lies in the faces — the diverse multiracial army of ordinary women and men from every walk of life, race and class — united to awaken the consciousness of a people and a nation. The NAACP will remain vigilant in its mission until the promise of America is made real for all Americans. ■

CALVARY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION —KEEPING YOU INFORMED

In just two short years, the Calvary Community Development Corporation (CCDC) has made tremendous strides! A 501(c)(3) organization whose mission is to enhance the well being of the Morris County community through education, outreach and collaborative partnerships, to date CCDC's primary focus has been directed on programming and services that enrich and empower youth. Its popular programs, YES Camp and Sportsense, serve as perfect examples.

YES CAMP

Licensed by the state of New Jersey in 2006, the YES Camp offers a well-rounded, six-week, innovative experience designed to stimulate and facilitate fun, enrichment, leadership development, worship and wellness. Steeped in Christian doctrine, YES campers develop skills and behaviors that lead to healthier lifestyle choices as well as caring and cooperative attitudes about responsibility, character building, leadership, and critical thinking.

Over the summer YES camp welcomed 40 energetic campers in grades K-8. The children enjoyed six fun-filled weeks of swimming, frequent field trips, nutritious lunches and snacks, and life-influencing religious instruction. According to the exit surveys submitted by the children and their parents, a great time was had by all. "It's a blessing to have a place to send my child that I can afford, and she gets something out of it," noted one parent. "The parent meeting was great. It set expectations and boundaries," commented another. More than 80% of the respondents rated their overall satisfaction with the program as excellent, with swimming at Streeter Pool being a colossal hit. One camper's comment sums it all up, "I would come back because camp was pretty cool this year."

SPORTSENSE

Originally established in 2000 as the

Athletic Assistance Fund, Sportsense affords young people an opportunity to participate in community recreational leagues by providing financial assistance through an objective, competitive selection process. For the 2011-2012 fall and winter seasons, twenty young people will receive Sportsense scholarships to participate in such extracurricular activities as football, basketball, cheerleading, soccer, and gymnastics. Research shows that youth who play sports benefit in numerous ways. Notably, children are more likely to have a positive body image and healthy self-esteem and less likely to be overweight. Perfectly aligned with First Lady Michelle Obama's "Let's Move" campaign, the Sportsense initiative encourages children to put down their video game controllers and move their bodies instead.

CCDC GOVERNANCE

Eight focused and dynamic individuals serve on CCDC's Board of Directors. Six of the eight are Calvary members: Donna Wilson, chair; Deacon Henry Lee, treasurer; Patra Brown, vice chair; Michelle Gibson; and Minister Carol Lynn Patterson. Donna Hansbury of Atlantic Health System; Detective Keisha Higgs of the Morris County Prosecutor's Office and Bette Simmons, of the County College of Morris also serve on the board. Ms. Simmons is the board secretary.

The Board of Directors selected Ferlanda Fox Nixon as CCDC's new executive director. During the search process, Minister Patterson dedicated her time and talents to the organization serving as the interim executive director.

Ms. Nixon is a leadership consultant specializing in executive and professional development, communication and presentation skills, and meeting facilitation skills. In addition to having practiced corporate law for 18

years, Ms. Nixon has diverse leadership experience with numerous not-for-profit organizations such as the New Jersey Women Lawyers Association, The Hope Chest Scholarship Foundation, the Women's Association of the New Jersey Performing Arts Center, and the Girl Scout Council of Greater Essex and Hudson Counties, serving in a variety of capacities. As executive director of CCDC, Ms. Nixon will be charged with strategically and aggressively expanding and monitoring CCDC's programming and community outreach, developing and promoting CCDC's brand, and increasing and managing CCDC's funding and revenue sources.

ACCEPT AND WELLSPRING

Responsible for the overall governance of and financial and operational efficiency and effectiveness of CCDC, the Board of Directors has retained consultants to assess and analyze CCDC's school-aged childcare program, ACCEPT, and mental health counseling services, Wellspring. Consequently, the board has elected to suspend the operation of ACCEPT and Wellspring pending review of the consultants' reports and recommendations.

CHANGED TO MAKE CHANGE

"Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." – 2 Corinthians 5:17

As we contemplate our 2011 church theme "New Wine in New Wineskins," we must realize that to effectively handle and promulgate new wine, we ourselves have to be transformed and qualified as God's instruments. Regardless of our pedigree, precociousness, or position in society, we all have fallen short of the mark and must be changed in order to be used of God in His service. And what a glorious change it is when the Master takes hold of us, and molds us and shapes us into a new creation. Like Paul, we can revel in the fact that though we are unworthy, God has seen fit to elevate us into the heavenly realm by adopting us into His family. Let's look at the remarkable changes God makes in our lives as we become His children.

OUR STATION IN LIFE HAS BEEN CHANGED

We become a privileged and prepared people: We are told that the Father "hath made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in light," which plainly put means, that we have been quali-

A SHAKER AND MOVER

The Connection is proud to announce that a member of our congregation, Natalie Lattimore has received a major award for her role in social awareness and campus leadership. Earlier this summer, she was one of 1500 students invited to attend an all-expense-paid four-day conference in Washington, D.C. at the Helix Hotel, sponsored by the organization Campus Progress. However, she was only one of four individuals who were given special awards.

For her role as President of the student government at the County College of Morris (CCM), Natalie was crowned "Activist of the Year" in recognition of her leadership in promoting issues of concern to the student body. The awards committee was so impressed with her work that a unique trophy was designed in her honor – a "Ninja" figure that symbolized her ability to shake and move the established order of things. In one of the "meet and greet" sessions, she was personally congratulated by former President of the United States, Bill Clinton, and Kathleen Sebelius, Secretary of Health & Human Services in President Obama's cabinet.

Natalie's dramatic thrust into leadership began when she decided to run for the office of President during the student government election in the Spring of 2010. Shortly after arriving on campus at CCM, she realized that a significant number of students at the college were receiving financial aid, yet they had little or no voice in the swirling controversy about pending cuts in state and federal aid to all students. To complicate matters, there was also a heated debate going on at the school about how budget cuts would affect tuition rates for immigrant students, many of whom were undocumented.

Having come from a background where she had seen many of her relatives and friends become victims of social injustice, and where many people she knew were denied opportunities that should have been open to them, Natalie felt compelled to take a stand and speak up about campus issues that were not being addressed in the interests of students. She believed that the best way to be heard was to serve as a spokesperson through the platform provided by student government President. So, she ran for the office. She campaigned so forcefully that her only opponent dropped out of the race and easily won the seat.

Early in her tenure, she decided to assert leadership in two principle areas of campus concern: (1) Negative sentiment against immigrants seeking to gain access to affordable higher education, and; (2) advocacy regarding government budget cuts affecting all students receiving financial aid. Though there was some resistance from many conservative students about focusing on these issues, Natalie's persuasive leadership in her new role helped convince the majority of students that these were key items that needed addressing. After writing a grant application to Campus Progress seeking \$5,000 to support advocacy for these causes, the organization recognized her leadership skills and the rest is history. Not only was the grant funded, but she was nominated for this prestigious award. Let's all congratulate her on a job well done, and encourage her to keep honing her leadership skills for the betterment of our community. ■

"Living Inside Out" was the theme for the 2011 Youth Enrichment Summer Camp. The curriculum was designed to encourage Campers to apply Bible truths to their everyday life. Their Bible lessons from Psalm 33:4 "For the word of the Lord holds true, and we can trust everything He does." 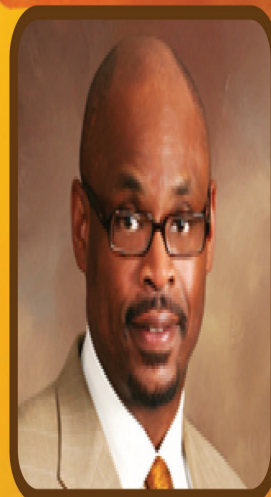
