## Hallel (Hallelujah) Psalms: A Call to Honor God

## 1. Background and Nature of "Hallel" Psalms

A. From the verb Halal - "to praise"

- Typically, although not exclusively, identified as Psalms 113-118.
- These Psalms are known as the "Egyptian Hallel." These Psalms recount Yahweh's saving deeds in deliverance. Moses is often given credit as the author.
- Sung during 3 major feasts: Passover, Pentecost, Tabernacle

Hallel Psalms were especially central to the Passover Feast:

- Pilgrims sung them on the way to Jerusalem
- Jewish families sang Psalm 113-114 before the Seder meal and Psalm 115-118 afterward.
- Jesus and the disciples sung a hymn between Passover meal and Mt. of Olives (Mark 14:26)
- B. Psalms were sometimes sung antiphonally
